WORSHIP SURVEY FOLLOW-UP REFLECTIONS

A long, long time ago, in a prepandemic world, Calvary Church participated in a Worship Survey in February 2019, followed by a Worship Survey Follow-Up in February 2020. Because of the constantly changing nature of worship and more immediate worship needs these past several months, it has taken us some time to process the results of the survey. The results have now been seen and discussed by the Worship Planning Team and the Calvary Consistory.

There were 119 Calvary people who completed the Worship Survey Follow-up compared to 111 from the original Worship Survey. Having processed and discussed the results of the survey with Pastor Eli, the Worship Planning Team, and the Consistory, I am pleased to say that the results of the surveys overwhelmingly positive: The people who took the survey value the worship ministry here at Calvary.

There are many images/charts from the survey that I could share

to demonstrate the positivity of the survey. The most telling image is the chart that accompanies this article. Well over half of you (56 percent) believe we are where we should be with our worship ministry, (compared to 44 percent last year) and 35 percent of you believe we are on the right track with what we are doing (compared to 44 percent last year). This means that over 91 percent of you either like where we are or like where we are headed. The main thing that changed this past year is that more of you believe we are closer to where we should be.

For us as leaders in worship ministry, this is extremely exciting and encouraging. Worship ministry is often a point of great contention and division. Here at Calvary this is a great strength on which we

will stay the course and continue to reform.

As I read the comments and processed the data, I tried to think of the best way to capture what it is we are trying to do with our worship ministry and why so many of you have grabbed hold of what we are doing.

I believe it comes down to a vision of worship that has the appropriate balance of being missional and covenantal. While many people like to delineate worship as being "contemporary" or "traditional," I think it is more helpful to think of worship in these categories.

Worship must be covenantal and missional; it must faithfully disciple those within the church (covenantal) and those outside it (missional). Thus, the metrics by which we evaluate whether worship is truly covenantal and missional is by asking ourselves: 1) Is our worship helping faithfully disciple those within our congregation, young and old? 2) Is our worship contributing to the discipleship of new people into the covenant community?

The data of the worship survey and worship survey follow-up combined with the discipling of new members indicates that we are doing what we can to craft worship that is covenantal and missional.

While it is certainly impossible to truly survey members on the impact of our worship on the true strength of their discipleship, it is clear from the worship survey that our members believe our worship is helping them grow (covenantal worship). At the same time, it is clear from other data in the follow-up that the people of Calvary believe that what we are doing is connecting better with those from outside our church/tradition (missional worship).

Many churches have worship that is either missional or covenantal. Missional worship, often referred to as "seeker sensitive" worship, aims at connecting those outside the church to the church community. Exclusively covenantal worship would be worship that only pays attention to the worship needs/ desires of the people who are already part of that specific church community.



Worship should be neither exclusively missional nor exclusively covenantal.

If our worship is aimed purely at those outside the faith/church, we miss out on our responsibility to the covenant community. The church is not a random assortment of individuals, it is a community of people who have covenanted to follow Jesus together. Our worship ministry is certainly one of the ways we keep this commitment.

Likewise, if our worship is aimed purely at ourselves and what "I like" and what "we are used to," we are missing out on our mission. If our focus is exclusively on "keeping our people happy," we are being selfish and inward focused.


Obviously, this balance is difficult to strike and involves intentional leadership, careful listening, and a commitment to mission. The good news is that the results of the surveys as well as the nature of the growth we have experienced as a church seems to confirm that we are doing what we can to be covenantal and missional. There is always room for growth and re-evaluation (which the Worship Planning Team is committed to doing) but we are extremely excited about the way the Spirit has led and is leading us with our worship ministry.

To be sure, trying to please everyone is impossible (and, I would argue, is unhealthy/unbiblical) and worship ministry should always have a reforming character to it. However, we are thankful both for the encouragement and the level of involvement that we continue to see from the people of Calvary. We are so thankful for how receptive Calvary has been to the leadership we are providing.

May God bless us as we continue to follow the Spirit's leading with our worship ministry!

CALVARY IS HOSTING MINNEAPOLIS SERVE AUGUST 2022

Calvary's council approved co-hosting the full, week-long, high school SERVE trip for the summers of 2022-2024 with Faith Christian Reformed Church of New Brighton, MN. Calvary hosted SERVE trips from 2007-2010 and has agreed to make another three year commitment with ThereforeGo Ministries (formerly Youth Unlimited) to bring high school students from churches across North

America for a week of discipleship, including work projects, worship services, and group activities around the Twin Cities. Jake Kamp, Facilities Director, is supportive of the event and has helped us determine August is the best time for Calvary's facilities because both Agamim and Berry Patch are not in the first few weeks of August.

The idea for this commitment began with the collaboration Travis Deur initiated with me. Travis is Classis Lake Superior's Youth Champion and is charged with connecting and encouraging the youth ministries of the churches in our classis. During one of his first visits with me, we walked around Calvary's facility and discussed how it would be a perfect space for hosting a SERVE trip.

As a result of this conversation, Calvary CRC and Faith CRC worked together in hosting TC Serve in the summer of 2019, a weekend ministry event that brought in 50 middle school students and ten high school helpers for community projects, worship services, and games in the gym. The event went so well, Travis and I began to think bigger.

We met with Amanda Rozenboom, SERVE Director of ThereforeGo Ministries, about possibly hosting the week-long high school SERVE trip this fall. Amanda was elated! She said with our facility, our location, Calvary's experience hosting SERVE, and two churches working together was an awesome equation for bringing a SERVE trip to the Twin Cities. Travis, who was recently ordained as a commissioned pastor at Faith CRC, proposed the idea to Faith's council, and they also unanimously approved.

Hosting SERVE is a big commitment, but speaking to Dalen and Sharon Asche, Linda Ribbens, Erica Liddle, Camryn Rettig, Aleida VanderBrug, and others who volunteered last time, they were overwhelmingly positive about the experience and about the prospect of hosting again. They loved leading and were amazed at the time and energy so many members of Calvary poured into the event. This time around, our church power will be doubled by working with Faith CRC. Faith CRC and Pastor Travis are very excited to contribute. This will continue to strengthen our relationship with our brothers and sisters in Christ at Faith CRC.

If you can't tell, I am pumped about hosting SERVE! I really think the SERVE experience is formative in making disciples of Christ and reflects strengths of our Reformed faith. Teenagers serve in the kingdom of God through bringing shalom to our communities by

packing food, painting houses, landscaping, playing with kids struggling through poverty, and supporting great local organizations. All this inspires them to find fulfillment in volunteering now and later on in their lives. Teenagers deepen their faith in Christ by hearing the Word of God proclaimed, discussing the meaning in small groups, and engaging in devotions. Teeangers build important friendships with others from their church and with other teens from other churches, building up the universal church.

And guess what? The kids LOVE IT! Almost every time I spend time with teens from our church, someone shares a great story from their SERVE experience - whether it be tubing down a river, some really goofy kid on their team, an epic volleyball game during free time, or some valuable friendships developed during the week.

Another reason I'm excited to host SERVE is for the leadership development of Calvary teenagers as they help run the event. At Sioux Falls SERVE, I experienced the close knit high school/college group work together and take on leadership roles and they had a blast doing it! I know our kids will too! And that's only the teenagers! Hosting SERVE mobilizes local churches and impacts everyone involved. ThereforeGo Ministry's SERVE Prep Kit says that the host church is a "temporary workforce" that will "bring glory to God, encouragement to believers and a strong testimony to those not yet following Christ, while advancing the efforts of the host church and network of ministries."

Calvary will be that type of workforce because this fits our mission and values as a church. My hope is that hosting SERVE trips becomes a long-term rhythm of our church ministry, continuing to transform lives by the Holy Spirit through SERVE year after year. Josh Van Hulzen, Jon's brother who works for First CRC in Sioux Falls, told me his church has hosted Serve for 18 consecutive years, and the church enjoys doing it every summer! I believe Calvary has the potential to become another constant SERVE location for many years.

Expect to hear more about hosting SERVE in the coming months!

Tim and Linda have both served on the school board.
- 7. Their children are adopted

 in 1988. They celebrate their
 birthdays AND their adoption
 anniversaries each year.
- 8. Tim was a CPA for 42 years and retired in 2020. In connection with one of his business clients back in the early-80s, he had dinner with Elliot Roosevelt (third son of FDR, 32nd president of the U.S.).
- 9. They enjoy traveling. For their 30th wedding anniversary, they went on a wonderful

- tour of the Holy Land. Their latest big trip was a bus and train tour through the Canadian Rockies in the summer of 2019 (see attached picture). Their favorite vacation is an annual time-share week in Hilton Head, SC.

Council Update

Most of you know in early 2020 the Calvary Improvement Project Committee was busy working with an architect to complete some initial plans to improve our building. Then suddenly COVID hit and stopped everything. With all the time that has passed the committee thought it was appropriate to give the congregation an update.

A few weeks ago, the committee met simply to reconnect on where we are after an abrupt halt to plans. In that meeting we recapped where we were before COVID and wondered if there were any ways to move forward. Here are some of the key updates from that meeting that I think are important to pass on to the congregation:

The committee was very excited to share the plans we had for Calvary in early 2020 and are still excited about these plans going forward. We wondered if there were any benefits to move forward despite the challenges of the pandemic. The unified response is we would not want to move forward until we could thoroughly present the plan to the full congregation in multiple, in-person meetings to get our church body fully behind the project. The consensus was that this approach is simply not possible with so many of our members remote and the inability to meet in groups effectively. The question also came up if there was any financial reason to move forward now such as a reduction in cost of the project. We reached out to our architect on the project and in most cases expenses are higher now for construction than they were earlier this year.

As we moved to the end of our meeting it was clear to the committee that even though Calvary is growing and God has blessed Calvary financially during this time, now is not the right time to do such a large project. However, it was abundantly clear at the conclusion of our meeting that everyone is still excited about moving forward with an improvement project at Calvary at the right time. We all agreed it is in God's hands and He will guide us with those decision-making processes alongside the congregation in the future.

If any of you have any questions about the project or have input, please reach out to me to talk further. I would be glad to hear your thoughts during this time or

answer any questions.

Where do you work?

I work for Cargill, based at the Excelsior Crossings location in Hopkins (although I've been working from home since March).

What are your roles and responsibilities?

My role in the Human Services department is currently split into two main functions. The first is administering Cargill's pension plans, which includes maintaining relationships with vendors, answering employee questions, working with auditors on the plan audits, and a lot of data review. The second role I perform is more of a subject matter expert/project manager role for the retirement plan activities and interfaces being impacted by a change in payroll/HR systems in 2021.

What are you currently working on that excites you?

Honestly, a lot about my job excites me. I love the interactions I have with co-workers, vendors, other Cargill employees, and all of the variety of people I get to work with on this large project. I love retirement plans. I am enjoying digging into a new system to discover how it works, analyzing the impact on our processes, finding ways to make things more efficient, and communicating with developers and end users alike.

What in your job reveals God's sphere sovereignty?

To give some background, Cargill's mission is to help the world thrive by nourishing the world. Cargill employs over 150,000 employees globally, who work with farmers, producers, manufacturers, retailers, governments, and more to accomplish this. Although I'm not in the field, labs, production facilities or other divisions, I work with many spheres

that need to work together to accomplish the company and employee goals: retirement goals for employees and employers, government regulations, global and local relationships, partnerships, and more. I love how God designed us to work together in all of these spheres to take care of one another. As we are all human, it isn't perfect, but you can see how all these spheres long for restoration, for elimination of hunger, taking care of God's creation.

How do you see God at work in your job?

As mentioned in the previous paragraph, I see God working through relationships, through our hearts and other ways as we interact, strive to educate employees about retirement benefits, maintain compliance with government regulations, answer questions, listen, and more. Cargill encourages giving and volunteering, and helping one another out, which is a gift to me and another way God works. God has definitely blessed me, walking beside me as I've been stretched and grown, gently showing my weaknesses, and building upon strengths. Whether I am working with an employee who is in a financial hardship, someone retiring and planning for their future, a developer working to build an interface with a vendor or whatever I am doing, I am encouraged to use the gifts God has given me for His glory and to work a little harder to improve my weaknesses, and experience God's grace each day.

Are your coworkers Christians? Have you had opportunities to talk with them about what they believe? Have you been able to share your faith in Christ with them?

Some of my coworkers are Christian, and others are not. I had several opportunities to bring up my faith with a former coworker who does not believe in Christ before she took another job opportunity. Although she hasn't come to know Christ, it was a privilege to speak freely about my faith with her. Within the retirement team, I'm blessed to have each of them know and believe in Christ. We discuss our beliefs, faith, struggles on a pretty frequent basis, and have been blessed to share some of our favorite Bible verses as comfort or encouragement, and pray for each other. What a blessing!
