## REDISCOVERING CHURCH

Twice per month, (once during full council meetings and once during team meeting nights) the full council of Calvary Church gathers for devotions, discussion, and prayer. The Council selects a book and then spends 30 minutes at each meeting discussing the required reading for that meeting followed by a time of prayer.

This past month, the Council began reading and discussing the book, "Rediscover Church: Why the Body of Christ is Essential." The book is written on the premise that because of the global pandemic, political, social and cultural strife, many Christians have stayed at home for worship or haven't been worshiping at all. The challenges of the past few years have made it easy for people to pull away from their church community no matter how involved/connected they had been.

As a council we chose this book not because scores of people from Calvary fit this narrative,
but because there is value in reminding ourselves why church matters. The council did affirm/ celebrate the vast majority of the Calvary community has stayed committed to in-person worship despite the challenges and that LiveStream worship has been a valuable tool, not a crutch. However, when you attend worship Sunday after Sunday, year after year with few interruptions and few reminders, it's easy to forget why you go at all. Even people who attend church regularly need reminders of why the church is essential to our spiritual lives.

One of the first lines of the book is, ".... a Christian without a church is a Christian in trouble."

## Serving Muskegon In Jesus' Name

A brave group of nine crawled (somewhat groggily) into a rental van at 6:00 am on July 9. The sugary donuts Camryn brought made the early morning a little sweeter. The destination was Muskegon for a SERVE trip. After two summers of mission trips being canceled due to COVID, the highlight of summer ministry was back in motion! For more than half of the group, this was their first SERVE experience. They were eager for the journey but did not know what to expect. We were only in Muskegon for less than an hour before the host church shuttled us over to Lake Michigan to enjoy the sunset on the beach. We didn't know anyone from the other church groups yet so we played football and walked the beach as a Calvary squad. Except Grace. Her social butterfly wings were flapping the first night. My goal for the rest of the group was to branch out, and that is what they did.

Every morning, we were sent off with our small group (a mixture of teens from different churches) to serve the community. Every night the host team fed us dinner. We ate like kings and queens because the host team told us they spent more than $\$ 8000$ on food! The worship band led us in singing praises to the Lord and a rotation of pastors taught us the Word of God. We discussed the messages and reflected on the day in our small groups. The nights finished with free time and games such as kickball, basketball, block ball, and laser tag. Yep, laser tag in the woods behind the church building.


The teenagers and the adult leaders had a wonderful week of Christian community. When a group commits to serve together, eat together, and worship together for a week, the Spirit shapes people to be more like Christ. The teenagers found joy in serving the community in Jesus' name. They found comradery in other Christian students from other towns. They strengthened their relationship with Jesus as their Savior and Lord of their lives. Here are a few stories from them:

Alaina Terpstra - We went to Deborah's house to clear out her garage and stain her deck. But then it rained so we huddled in her garage and got to play with her grandkids on a little basketball hoop. It was really fun to hang out with Deborah and her grandkids and reach out to them by hanging out.

Gabi Soerens - I had a super cool experience at Love INC, which stands for In Christ. They partner with other churches to provide for people trying to avoid homelessness. My small group prayed for them and they prayed for us. It was cool working with other believers throughout the week.

Abby Vis - On Thursday I worked in the community garden by pulling weeds and harvesting fruits and veggies. I talked to the volunteer ladies there and I learned they set out produce on the church driveway for impoverished people to take. Sometimes they have kids who have never eaten fruits like raspberries or strawberries come and it's cool to see how much they like healthy foods.

## NEAR

## Where do you work?

I am a lawyer at Faegre Drinker Biddle \& Reath LLP. Faegre Drinker is a law firm with offices in 19 cities in the United States and international offices in London and Shanghai.

## What are your roles and responsibilities?

I work in the business litigation group. Our group represents clients in a wide range of lawsuits. My primary areas of practice are in corporate litigation - disputes about corporate governance, transactions, and contracts - and in trade secret litigation. I am also involved in our firm's pro bono practice representing veterans in claims for disability and other compensation.

## What are you currently working on that you are excited about?

In Henry VI, Shakespeare wrote: "The first thing we do, let's kill all the lawyers." A common sentiment! Nobody wants to get involved in a lawsuit if they can help it.
But on the opposite side, it means people call me (and my fellow litigators) only when they really need us. So the most exciting aspect of my job is probably that we get to help our clients in some of the most important issues that they are facing. Getting involved in a lawsuit is a stressful, typically high-risk proposition. Whether we are representing large companies, family-owned businesses, or individuals, we have the opportunity to walk alongside our clients and guide them through these situations.

As an example, generally our military veteran clients have repeatedly tried on their own to get the benefits to which they are entitled. But even for people experienced with the government bureaucracy, it can be challenging to navigate the rules and regulations to get the right answer. It is gratifying to come into the situation, advocate on their
behalf, and help break through the frustration that they have so often experienced.

Since God is sovereign over every sphere, how do you see God at work in your job? We live in a broken world, and without the brokenness caused by sin, my job wouldn't exist. But I believe that God uses the justice system to address the problems caused by sin. I think we can see this most clearly by comparing our experience in America to places around the world. There are so many countries where people cannot trust the authorities to protect them, and they cannot trust that they will even be given a chance at justice if they plead their case. Of course, the American justice system is not perfect - not by a long shot - since it is still run by sinful humans. Even so, I see God's hand at work in providing us with an institution that helps mediate the effects of our sin.

Are your coworkers Christians? Have you had opportunities to talk with them about what they believe? Have you been able to share your faith in Christ with them? Many of my coworkers are Christians. (One of my co-workers even preaches on a regular basis at a church here in the Twin Cities although he is a Baptist, so I tell him that he doesn't get full credit for that). We have a fairly diverse workplace, and I would say that people are generally fairly open about their religion. Or maybe that is just me. In any event, I try to be open about my faith and open to conversations with my colleagues. As anyone who follows the Supreme Court's decision knows, there have been a lot of decisions over the past several years that touch on issues that go to the heart of where we are as humans. Since lawyers are keenly interested in these cases, they are often topics of discussion and they have provided the opportunity for several conversations with colleagues that went beyond the law to deeper issues of faith.

## LEADING THE MISSION

Council Update

You do not want to miss this article as it is filled with drama, humor, and highly entertaining antidotes.

In June we welcomed five new Council members, reassigned Shepherding district elders and deacons as needed, established Council teams, and elected officers. We also closed our books for Fiscal 2022. We thank all of you and praise God that we continue to be in a good financial position. Congregational giving was a little below budget (\$634k given vs. \$660k budget) but lease income exceeded our budget by a little and we were able to keep expenses below budget. We ended the year with a modest amount of excess cash. We asked two Calvary members who work in the finance world to review our financial books. They conducted their review, offered a few suggestions, which we are implementing, and indicated that our bookkeeping and finances are in very good order. We owe a big thanks to Dianne DePenning (our Bookkeeper), Marcus VanderBrug (Treasurer), and Tim Ribbens (recently retired Council Chair, retired CPA, and always willing to help and provide advice on Calvary's finances) for our financial books being in great shape!

Congregational giving in Fiscal 2023 (this June and July) is right on budget. Thank you for that. Ministries Fund giving is not always exciting as it "only" pays for electricity, snow plowing, etc. But wait, it also pays for our awesome pastors and staff, and many other very important things. Please continue to give generously to our Ministries Fund so that Calvary remains healthy, vibrant, and growing.

As we've stated many times in the past year, we have re-engaged the Commons Renovation Team (CRT). In July the Council dedicated the majority of our meeting to the Commons Renovation topic and invited several CRT members to provide a complete update on the background, vision, design, purpose, cost estimates, and an initial schedule for the renovation. We will be providing much more information to all of you in the coming months and will be seeking your input on the renovation.

At our Congregational Meeting, we told you the Administrative Team (AT) and Council believed our Facility

Team (Jake's team) was understaffed. We consulted several other churches of similar size and confirmed our concern. The F2023 budget (Jun 2022 to May 2023) you approved at the Congregational Meeting, included funds for a larger custodial staff. In light of that, we were very happy to be able to hire Kay Harkema to a 30 hours per week position. Kay is already doing a great job in her expanded role on our Facilities Team and we ask you to thank her (and everyone else on the Facility Team) when you see her.

We have nearly completed some sorely needed, major maintenance to our building. The roof over the library area was leaking, was in very poor condition, and didn't meet current codes. We had the roof redesigned to meet codes and we replaced it this summer, along with the multiple (very old) A/C units mounted on that roof. We also replaced several furnaces (some dating to the early 1970s) and A/C units in other portions of the building, along with outdated dampers and controls for those units. The last $A / C$ unit in that project will be installed this month and the project will be complete.

We're sure you've all noticed the plantings are all in (and blooming!) around our new patio. Thank you to everyone who helped make that happen.

Our student and adult guests at Twin Cities SERVE indicated it was a great week and a success. The national SERVE director visited and observed
activities during the first several days of TC SERVE and told Pastor Eli and Pastor Travis Deur (from Faith CRC) that they were impressed, everything was well organized, and they were confident TC SERVE was on its way to being a great success. Those who benefited from the SERVE projects were also very appreciative. Pastor Eli and Pastor Travis signed us up for Twin Cities SERVE 2023!
