## A YEAR OF COVID-19

On Monday, March 9, 2020, the Full Council of Calvary Church had a normal, monthly meeting. We agreed that because of rising COVID-19 concerns, we should not have a normal "Mutual Greeting" during worship the following Sunday. Three days later, in-person worship was cancelled and would be for the following three months.

If you would have told me a year ago the persistent challenges that we would need to endure as students, parents, workers, citizens, leaders, and churchgoing disciples of Jesus, I would have been in disbelief. To be sure, there is much to grieve and there are many whose challenges have been greater than what many of us have faced. But so many of the challenges we have faced this past year have been so peculiar and sustained, it is hard to conceive of life and thought in a pre-COVID-19 world.

I write these words as a pastor and leader at Calvary. I want you all to know how proud (in a humble, Christ-like way!) I am of Calvary Church. The grace, patience, kindness, and faithfulness with which we have endured these challenges together brings joy and gratitude to my heart.

The patience you have had in embracing the changes in worship, the guidelines have followed, the loss of programming, the loss of social interaction (how we all miss church cookies!), has made being a leader/pastor here at Calvary not only easier, but invigorating. Additionally, to witness so many people step up in so many ways with sound, audio, camera work, stage improvements, lighting, worship leadership challenges, care for others, adapting ministry/ Bible study, etc.

## MINISTRIES UPDATE



"What does this Bible verse teach us about the Holy Spirit?"

"How does the wisdom of God differ from the wisdom of the world according to 1st Corinthians?"

"Husbands, what is a way your wife displays inner beauty? Wives, what is a way your husband treats you with respect?"

What does it mean to "cast your anxiety on him"?

These are some questions that we have discussed at Life Group on Wednesday nights with young adults in our 20s and 30s this past year. As you can imagine, the questions sparked deep conversations in which we learn from each other's experiences, insight, and primarily, from the Word of God.

For example, I remember the first question stated above was asked about 1 Corinthians 1:18-26. We always take note of what the Bible teaches us about the Spirit given the mystery but immense importance of the Spirit's activity in our lives. We examined the fascinating phrase that Apostle Paul inked to the church in Corinth that reads in the Greek "πνεύματος, πνευματικοίς πνευματικα" which is the Greek word for Spirit three times in a row in different forms, transliterated "pneumatos, pneumatikois, pneumatika." The phrase means that as spiritual people, we need the Spirit to help us understand spiritual truths from God. In this situation, the Spirit is a guide into truth, helping us learn about the gospel of Jesus. The Spirit fires in our hearts and minds so we can deepen our knowledge and love for God.

Our group loves to go deep into the Holy Scriptures and I'm so thankful for everyone's hunger for truth. I pray the Spirit continues to guide our discussions to encourage us in our faith and deepen our trust in the Lord. The focus on the Bible is foundational to our Life Group - without it we would simply be a social club - but we do more than just study the Scriptures. We build relationships. Many young adults come to the Twin Cities either fresh out of college or after accepting a new job in the area. Trying to connect







with other young adults who are committed to Christ in a metro of three million people is actually very challenging. Just ask anyone in our group! In college, you are surrounded with people your age and you can find others with similar interests who are in the same life phase. Once you enter the "real world" there may be no one at your job that is your age, and if there is, they may be living a lifestyle that you do not want to emulate. Sometimes you may have family connections in the area, which is great, but that doesn't fill the desire for friends that are close in age.

That's where Life Group comes in clutch. We have welcomed many newcomers to the Twin Cities with open arms and I've heard many of the young adults say how thankful they are to connect with a group like ours. They feel affirmed in their faith that is challenged everyday by the society around them. They feel like they belong to a community of faith and they feel full after eating a delicious meal!

Let's be honest, everyone likes to eat! Especially after a hard day's work on Wednesday! Many Life Groupers have told me they look forward to Wednesdays because they don't have to plan or make a meal that night. I don't blame them!

Eating together is something Jesus did with his disciples all the time. It wasn't just to fill hungry tummies; it was to talk about life while enjoying a meal. I've learned through my experiences at other churches, through seminary and my internship, that focusing on the relational side of Life Group is an

essential part of the discipleship process. To discuss the life-changing gospel of Jesus, it makes sense that you should know and care about the people you are talking to. Enjoying a meal together and talking about the construction site, the classroom, the office, the inlaw visit, and everything else about your week is a very Christ-like thing to do, and that's why we spend about 45 minutes eating and about 45 minutes discussing the Bible verses.

If you know anyone in their 20s and 30s who is looking for such a group, please send them our way! Text or email me their contact info if they are willing, and I will gladly invite them. I've invited many people. Some have never come, some came once, and some have come almost every time and have joined our church! I have learned some individuals not connected to a church might be more willing to come to small group Bible study than a church service because it is more casual and low-key; and there's food!

If you have a network of people that you think would like to enjoy friends, faith, and food together, please contact Pastor Nick or myself and we will help you set up a group and show you how to be a facilitator. It's not that hard and it's very enjoyable and fulfilling. It is an awesome way to be a "mini-church" inside Calvary Christian Reformed Church and do life together.

Interview with Carol Bengry

#### Where do you work?

I am employed at WEX, the Health division located in Edina, MN. WEX is a leading financial technology service provider simplifying payment solutions across the globe and industries including fleet, corporate payments, and healthcare.

#### What are your roles and responsibilities?

I have been with WEX for thirteen years and have been through three merger/acquisitions over that time; with each change my role and responsibilities changed. I am the receptionist - answering phones, maintaining security controls and visitors. Secondly, I am the administrative assistant for two of our executives, maintaining their calendars, expenses, travel, meetings and special projects. Lastly, I am the human resources contact in the Edina office. I conduct the onboarding process for new hires as well as assisting with some terminations. I lead our culture club which organizes charity events and social events for employees.

## What are you currently working on that you are excited about?

With our entire organization working from home, WEX has adopted the virtual world rapidly and efficiently. Our partner events which usually would be in Miami or Scottsdale, are now done from our home offices. Currently I have been participating in Executive Round Table discussions. Our executive leadership team invites ten to fifteen of our Partner executives to discuss topics that are important to them and how WEX can help them improve and simplify those areas of concern. Examples in some of these discussions are how to recruit good sales people, how to maneuver new legislation pertaining to healthcare and how to better assist our Partner's customers.

# What in your job reveals God's sphere sovereignty?

Let me highlight key words from the WEX mission statement: community driven, honest, innovative, and relational. WEX is very clear, empathetic, friendly, and

personal with our external and internal customers. I see God through our Employee Resource Groups (ERG), these groups all led by WEX employees range from WEXVets, WEXPRIDE, Women@WEX and WEXInclusion. WEX uses all the diversity in it's employees to broaden our worldly view in technology and community. For example, when the George Floyd protests and riots occurred in May 2020, WEX allowed their employees use ETO (Emergency Time Off) to help out the community by gathering necessities for those affected by the riots. I see God at work through a variety of ways: we started open dialogue around race, inclusion and acceptance using virtual meetings to discuss and learn about unconscious bias and helped our employees and their community in Costa Rica when tropical storms caused extensive damage. I see God's handiwork in the use of our new technologies that help people better understand and access their healthcare benefits.

#### How do you see God at work in your job?

I have been given opportunities to expand my duties and network internally and externally with the WEX organization. Each new opportunity I see God guiding me and opening up my mind to see His handiwork in each of these new roles. I mainly see Him through the many people I am in contact with and the many ways I can assist them. I am blessed to work for an organization that values it's best resource, people.

# Are your co-workers Christians? Have you had opportunities to talk to them about what they believe? Have you been able to share your faith in Christ with them?

I work with many Christians and am grateful to be able to talk freely with them as well as those coworkers of other faiths. I've learned about their beliefs and we have nice conversations. I consider myself the WEX bartender if you will... my desk is located in the lobby. I have seen my coworkers come and go and through the years have developed strong friendships with some. One example is when a friend came to me with a heavy family issue. She needed to talk to someone. We went to a conference room and I listened and prayed with her. Other advantages of these friendships are talks about our lives, children and what we did over the weekend. I get to share openly about the great concerts I've been too and our church events such as Fall Fest and VBS. I've shared our church website with coworkers and I have had coworkers share faith-based apps with me. God is present and I see his works throughout my day. It is a blessing!!

Council Update

One of my more memorable council meetings took place on a Wednesday or Thursday evening. The meeting was called on short notice to decide if we should cancel worship for the upcoming Sunday. I recall saying something like this: "We probably need to cancel this week, and maybe next week. But we shouldn't get ahead of ourselves. Maybe we can be back in a few weeks." That was just over a year ago. It shows, as well as anything, that our lives truly are not in our own control, but are entirely in God's hands.

The last three years have certainly been an interesting time to serve on Calvary's council. I started as a deacon in the summer of 2018. Since I started, we have hired two pastors, welcomed Agamim, and learned what it means to worship on our sofas and in our cars. This was on top of all the usual events in the life of our church: celebrating births, mourning deaths, saying good-bye to friends who move away, welcoming new ones, preparing annual budgets, rejoicing in professions of faith from our youth, and all the other both mundane and profound details of our life together.

Through everything, God's hand has been apparent. I have served as Calvary's treasurer for the past two years. In that role, I have a front-row seat to observe how many blessings God has showered on us. I don't mean primarily financially – although God has blessed us with a generous community that always steps up to provide for our communal needs - but mainly through the commitment and love our community has for each other. We have dedicated staff who work hard to keep our facility and operations running smoothly as well as an incredible group of volunteers who lead and guide our ministries. It's been a difficult year for our brothers and sisters in El Guanacaste. The pandemic and not one but two hurricanes have brought significant challenges especially to the remote communities in Honduras.

Through the generosity of several Christian Reformed churches, including Calvary, World Renew and Diaconia Nacional were able to carry out a food distribution to several communities that were in great need of assistance after the hurricanes swept through the countryside. Arturo Colindres, with Diaconia Nacional, has been visiting the communities when travel is permitted and safe and recently he was able to meet with members of the community of El Guanacaste. We hear from Pastor Modesto, the pastor of the Christian Reformed church in Guanacaste, where he lives with his wife and children. When we were last in Honduras Pastor Nick and Pastor Modesto visited each member of the church in their homes and prayed with them. Pastor Modesto is mentored by Pastor Livil, from Mangulile, who works with several churches in the area supporting leaders and encouraging them in their work.

Hermado and his wife Jarellie are a couple from the community that teams from Calvary have gotten to know during our visits. We learned Hermando is an excellent soccer player. One of the projects Calvary supported was a cement floor in their house. In the video, Jarellie, who is a teacher, talks to us from her kitchen.

Casiano is another member of the community we see briefly in the video. When we were last in Guanacaste he happily allowed the women on the team a ride on his horse and joked that if he charged a fee for the rides he could raise enough money to build a bridge over the river. We discovered he also likes pizza when we hosted pizza night for the community.

These are a few of the sweet faces of the people in Guanacaste, we are glad to introduce them to you and thankful for the technology that allows us to stay connected when we are apart.
