In this edition of *The Proclaimer*, there is an article written by our new missionaries in Uganda, Anthony and Sara Sytsma. Please read this article and hear about the great kingdom work that God is doing through them there! A big thank you to the Calvary diaconate for their diligence and hard work in vetting and committing to these new missionaries. We will begin financial support for them in our next fiscal year.

Calvary's commitment to these new missionaries is exciting to me not only because of the work the Sytsmas are doing but because of what this commitment means for our mission: to proclaim the good news of Jesus in word and deed here, near, and far. Clearly, the support of missionaries on the other side of the world is a way to better fulfill the "far" aspect of our mission.

But what excites me even more is how our commitment to the Sytsmas coupled with our

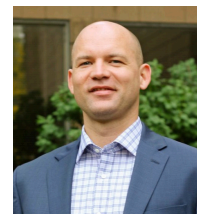
commitment to El Guanacaste in Honduras fulfills the "word and deed" aspect of our mission.

The inclusion of "word and deed" ministry in our mission is very intentional. We believe that the proclamation of the gospel ("word" ministry) must be done in tandem with acts of love, justice, and restoration ("deed" ministry). Deed ministry gives credence and experience to word ministry and are best done together.

We are partnering with the Sytsmas through Resonate, which is our denomination's global missions agency. Anthony's ministry is to teach and train pastors for "word" ministry in Uganda. We are partnering with

El Guanacaste through World Renew, which is our denomination's international relief and community development agency. Much of our work there has been "deed" ministry in the form of relief efforts and community transformation. The Sytsmas work is primarily about "word" ministry and our work in El Guanacaste is primarily about "deed" ministry.

However, both relationships include a "word and deed" partnership with each other. Through our presence and deed ministry in El Guanacaste, we have the opportunity to proclaim the gospel message when we are there and through the local Christian Reformed Church in that community. Sara Sytsma actively works to connect the Christian faith with daily life through agriculture, creation care, nutrition, and cooking education. Thus, both "Far" ministries help us fulfill our commitment to "word and deed" ministry.

Our hope and prayer as leaders is that we can build a partnership and relationship with the Sytsmas much like the relationship we have with El Guanacaste. In the past, many churches had the mentality of supporting as many missionaries in as many parts of the world as possible. While this idea is admirable, it usually means a small amount of relational/financial support to each. One of the hopes in supporting one missionary family and one global community is that we build a strong relationship/partnership with them and support them in more meaningful ways.

We already have a strong relationship with El Guanacaste on which we will continue to build. I invite you now to build a strong relationship with the Sytsmas. Please subscribe to their email list, read their blog, friend them on Facebook (Anthony posts a lot of interesting articles and links), write them notes of encouragement, wish them a happy birthday, include them in your Christmas Card e-distribution, etc.

Partnerships in the gospel can be life-giving and empowering in many ways. May we continue to be a community that has strong partnerships in the gospel!

We thank the Lord for drawing these two wonderful young families into our covenant community. They are a blessing to our church and they have communicated that our church is a blessing to them. Calvary Christian Reformed Church is growing and we pray the Holy Spirit will add more to our number so we can live out the Great Commission of making disciples of all peoples. To help us continue to build relationships with our new members, here are some details they shared with our church.

Greg, Alisha, and Daniel Stewart

Alisha grew up in a "challenging" single mom household. There was a lot of tough stuff in her childhood but her mom and grandparents were strong faith examples. She developed a deep relationship with Christ early on and he has demonstrated incredible faithfulness



through so much. Even though she grew up in the church, when she was 13 she went on a mission trip to Mexico where she first experienced Christ in a real way. During college at Southern Illinois University in Carbondale, IL, her faith was challenged by what she saw around her but she was blessed with a Christian roommate and they navigated those challenges together. Also during this time she joined the Air Force and somehow fit in five deployments to the middle east.

My (Greg's) parents, grandparents, aunts/uncles have all been Christians as long as I can remember. All have been great examples of faith my entire life. I would say my faith became personal when I was in middle school, we had a great youth program at the time and I completed our church's discipleship class. My college years were probably the most influential in growing, challenging, and deepening my relationship with Christ. The school emphasizes "critical engagement in the contemporary world" and this has stuck with me. An ongoing question for me is: How do I love Jesus and also engage with a broken world? I believe we are called not to hide away from the world but dig in and make an impact. After school I joined the Air Force and that's when the real world hit me, the Christian bubble I was living in was gone and now it was up to me, this is when I really learned to own my faith.

Alisha and I met in 2011 at McChord Air Force Base in Washington. We learned early on that faith was central to both our lives and was a

non-negotiable for a relationship/marriage. We dated for about six months and the day Alisha met my parents we booked the church to get married! Shortly after that, I got orders and was going to Korea, so we moved everything up, planned a wedding in six weeks, got married on New Year's Eve 2011, and moved to Korea in Feb 2012 for two years. These first two years were tough but also amazing for Alisha and I to be on our own, separated from our families to figure out what our life together would look like. It was up to us to figure out how to live in Korea and we grew a lot as a result. During our next eight years of moves, deployments, schools, houses, etc. we continued to be challenged by life but our relationship and faith has remained strong. Over the years we have been involved with Younglife Military, Mission Aviation Fellowship, World Vision, and support a couple missionaries. We aren't exactly sure what the future holds but the dream is to run our own business/ministry and be able to work together day-to-day.

We both accept and continue to choose to make Jesus Christ the savior and director of our lives, marriage, and family. We are both sinful, broken people but know we are saved once and for all by Christ's sacrifice and grace for us. We manage God's money for our sustenance and enjoyment but ultimately for His glory, impact, and purposes. We are committed to raising Daniel to develop a deep and lasting relationship with Jesus.



We firmly believe a strong faith community is essential for growth, joy, accountability and we want to contribute to serving others in that community. We understand that our world is broken but early on we committed to engage with our world and under God's direction, advance His kingdom.

Where do you work?

I work as the Development Director at Urban Homeworks in North Minneapolis, where our mission is to perpetuate the hope of Jesus Christ through innovative community development. We accomplish that mission through neighborhood outreach and community organizing, acquiring and managing affordable, dignified apartments, and developing homeownership opportunities as a means toward stability and building generational wealth.

What are your roles and responsibilities?

As Development Director, I lead a team of four developing the relationships and resources necessary to accomplish our mission. In other words, I'm a fundraiser. At its core, fundraising is about building relationships with people around shared goals, learning what people care about and what they are called to do with the resources God has given them. It is an incredible job where I get to create opportunities for people to invest in their values and share the incredible difference generous giving makes in their hearts and in communities.

What are you currently working on that you are excited about?

So many things! First, in response to the violence of the last year, Urban Homeworks is leading a collaboration of local nonprofit partners to bring our resources together to ensure our communities are safe. We have committed significant resources to this work, recognizing that community development

requires community safety, and are doing everything we can to keep the residents in our communities safe.

Second, Urban Homeworks is doubling down on our work to close the racial homeownership gap in the Twin Cities. The Twin Cities has the largest disparity in homeownership rates between white and black homeowners: 70% for whites while only 21% for blacks. That's not just the largest disparity in Minnesota - it's the largest in the entire country. In efforts to reduce this gap, Urban Homeworks is using generous gifts from donors to create a down payment assistance fund that specifically invests in first-generation, first-time homebuyers from black, indigenous, and communities of color.

Third, I am excited to be working on a funding campaign that is meant to inspire the conversation on using our assets (in addition to our tithe) to serve God and others. Through this campaign, we invite donors to set aside a portion of assets to be used as interest-free loans for Urban Homeworks. Urban Homeworks uses this financing to acquire and rehab even more homes and apartment buildings, creating stable homes and stable communities in a housing market that currently is creating neither.

What in your job reveals God's sphere sovereignty?

It is clear throughout the scriptures God's deep concern for those living in poverty. There are over 2,000 verses throughout the Bible concerning justice and poverty! My job is often to help people see how they can live out God's concern right here in the Twin Cities. There are 500,000 people in the U.S. who are living in their cars or on the streets every night for want of a home. There are 100,000 households in the Twin Cities alone who are paying over 50 percent of their income for the cheapest apartment they can find. These families are only an injury, car repair, or sick family member away also becoming homeless. In my daily conversations, I get to encourage people in how their personal actions care for the poor, and also how the systems we've set up do the same. How does capitalism support or oppress the poor? How do policies - past and present - impact the lives of the poor? When we vote, how are we advocating for

those with the greatest needs? When God speaks about justice and poverty, I believe he is asking these questions, and it is a blessing to daily explore how we can live out the answers.

How do you see God at work in your job?

One of my favorite parts of working in community development and fundraising is that at their very core both are about creating right relationships. One of my favorite books is *Until Justice and Peace Embrace*, where Nicholas Wolterstorff lays out a beautiful picture of God's shalom as experiencing peace and delight in all of our relationships: with God, with self, with community, and with creation. I am blessed to work in a space where God is building right relationships in each one of these spaces. He is drawing others to him as Urban Homeworks residents and neighbors are exposed to the hope of Jesus Christ as shared through our work. He is empowering neighbors to see themselves as beautiful image-bearers, and guiding donors in the wisdom that they are called to be ministers, not messiahs. He is building strong communities that listen to each other and work for each others' benefit. And he is also working in the hearts of donors to be in right relation with creation - the resources and assets he has given them to serve Him and serve others.

Are your co-workers Christians? Have you had opportunities to talk to them about what they believe? Have you been able to share your faith in Christ with them?

Some of my coworkers are Christians, and yet many are not. Yet with a mission to "perpetuate the hope of Jesus Christ through innovative community development", all of us are grappling with how we live out Jesus' teachings and ministry through our work every day. It is an environment where faith and religion are regularly discussed, examined, challenged, and grown. Such a community allows me the opportunity to celebrate and encourage fellow Christians in our shared desire to faithfully live out God's calling for shalom, and to share a table with non-Christian colleagues, donors, and residents who get to see Christ living in me in authentic and sacrificial love for my neighbor.

Meet the Sytsma's

FAR

Greetings from Soroti, Uganda! We are Sara and Anthony Sytsma from Resonate Global Mission. Both of us grew up in Michigan, but we have also lived in Minnesota and Texas. Anthony is ordained in the CRC and was the pastor of Emden CRC in Renville, MN for a couple years, while Sara taught science at Central Minnesota Christian School in Prinsburg. We joined Resonate in 2020, but have lived in East Africa for a total of nine years, seven of which have been in Uganda. Here in Uganda, we work mainly in partnership with churches from the Pentecostal Assemblies of God Uganda (PAG) in the region around Soroti. Anthony coordinates Timothy Leadership Training (TLT), and helps teach and disciple pastors. He also teaches a curriculum he helped to write called "Helping Without Hurting in Africa" based on the book When Helping Hurts. Sara works mainly with rural churches and communities to connect their Christian faith to everyday life, particularly in the areas of agriculture, caring for creation, and nutrition. She also teaches skills like building clay ovens and baking, using local materials.

We believe God has called us to long term ministry in East Africa in the areas of theological teaching and agricultural development. In our years of service in Uganda and in Kenya, God has used us to change the lives of many farmers and pastors and we learn so much from them as well. We long to see the good news of the gospel spread across the world so that more people will join in worshiping Jesus, the risen Savior. It gives us joy to be involved in this task through encouraging others in their relationship with God and by



helping them to glorify God in all aspects of their lives. We are confident that God will continue to use us, his imperfect vessels, to accomplish a small portion of his Kingdom work through the power of the Holy Spirit in our lives and through the gifts he has given us.

Thank you for your willingness to join us in this ministry through your support! Churches like yours which provide financial and prayer support are a vital part of our work; we couldn't do it without people like you. We look forward to having a chance to meet you the next time we are in the US visiting churches; in 2023, God willing. HONDURAS PARTNERSHIP

FAR

Calvary's partnership with El Guanacaste, Honduras is just one part of the work taking place in the community. World Renew and its local partner, Diaconia Nacional, have been working with the community leadership board to develop a community plan based on Biblical values that includes goals the people hope to accomplish to help all members of their community flourish. Transformation of the community happens when people unite to work toward accomplishing these goals.

An important step on the path to community transformation is trauma healing. Many people suffer trauma from ongoing poverty, illness/loss of loved ones, and domestic or sexual abuse. When victims of trauma or abuse are unable to take steps toward healing, they may themselves perpetuate an ongoing cycle of abuse. Healing the harm caused by trauma supports community building and empowers members to help others.

Recently, trauma healing workshops have been held in El Guanacaste. Community response has been good. A group of women and some men came together to study "Healing the Wounds of Trauma," a curriculum from the American Bible Society that World Renew uses in their work elsewhere in Honduras and in many other countries. Participants were encouraged to address their own pain and share their stories – and they did. This first step in healing the wounds of the heart empowers them to mentor others around them, helping transform the community.

Please pray for Cesar and Miguel working with members on the community plan exploring agricultural projects that support food security in the community. Pray for Casiano and the members of the leadership board as they learn ways to diversify crops and growing practices. Pray for wisdom for Pastor Modesto as he leads the congregation of the Christian Reformed Church in El Guanacaste—pray they will be unified and strengthened in their work. Pray that

a group from Calvary church will have an opportunity to visit our brothers and sisters in El Guanacaste in good time.
