AN INVITATION TO SIT FURTHER FORWARD

It's a question I've been asked at every church I have served: Why do so many people sit so far back in the sanctuary?

To be fair, I get it. My family and I visited another church recently and without thinking, we sat near the back. If I can help it, I don't like to be on display, especially when I am worshiping as a "normal person." It's nice to be able to get to the restroom without people noticing. If we feel led to raise our hands or clap in worship, we don't want to do so wondering what others might think of us. If we get distracted or fall asleep in worship (which I'm sure never happens at Calvary!), it's better that fewer people notice!

There are some who believe that a choice in where we sit in the sanctuary is indicative of some sort of spiritual reality. I read one article where a pastor associated several signs of spiritual unhealth with sitting near the back. I do not believe this is true or fair. I have witnessed the "back pew

phenomenon" at both healthy and dying churches, as well as churches of different traditions and denominations. However, I do believe there are practical reasons to sit further towards the front in worship.

So, I'd like to invite you and your families to consider sitting closer to the front of the sanctuary instead of the back or the balcony. Here's why:

1. Because the back is nicer for visitors. Whatever fear or discomfort we may have in sitting toward the front of the sanctuary in worship, visitors tend to have more. It's scary to be in a big sanctuary with a bunch of people you don't know engaging in worship that is unfamiliar.

Visitors are often scared they will do something out of place and draw unwanted attention to themselves. It is a service to our visitors to leave the back pews open.

- 2. Because the back is nicer for young families. We want to be welcoming to everyone including families with young children. They benefit especially from the pews toward the back because of the ease of leaving as needed (for the nursery, restroom, noise, misbehavior, etc.). We don't ever want young families to skip church because they are uncomfortable bringing their young children into the sanctuary. It is a service to them to leave the back pews open.
- 3. Because you can hear the music and voices of the congregation better. The acoustics of our sanctuary are such that the best place to hear the music of the Praise Team as well as the voices of our congregation are not from underneath the "overhang." The sound in the sanctuary has a harder time getting underneath the balcony overhang. The sound and singing are best in the middle of the sanctuary on the bottom level.
- 4. Because when most of the congregation sits toward the back and in the balcony, it looks like

- the sanctuary is empty. Our sanctuary is bigger than we need it to be. When we congregate in the back and in the balcony, our worship services can feel lightly attended or sparse. To visitors, this may send the message that our congregation is struggling or in trouble.
- 5. Because it's good to try out a different place. While there is value in having "our spot" and being near the same people during worship each week, there is also value in trying out a new spot and being near new/different people during worship.
- 6. Because I'm not scary. At least, I hope I am not! I'll admit, when people sit so far back in the sanctuary, it can feel like they are trying to stay as far away from me as possible and it makes the pulpit feel like an island. I've learned to get over this; but when I see the front six pews open, I often catch myself wondering, "What about me is so scary that people must sit so far back?"

I hope you read this article in the spirit in which it was intended: a spirit of love and kindness. I'm not trying to guilt anyone into sitting toward the front. This is clearly not a spiritual or a scriptural issue that I have felt convicted to share. But, it is worth an invitation! Thanks for considering.

The process of nominating potential deacons and elders to serve on Calvary's Council for the next three years is in process. If you suggested potential nominees – Thank You – we always need your input. If you have been contacted by the Nominations Committee and asked to consider serving, thank you for praying about your decision and for considering the nomination seriously. A few people have accepted being nominated, there are several others who are considering it, and we are on track in the nomination process.

Save the Date – Our Annual Congregational Meeting will occur after the worship service on **Sunday, May 5**. Calvary will provide lunch and everyone is encouraged to join us for lunch and the meeting. In addition to selecting deacons and elders for the upcoming three-year terms we will also present the budget for Fiscal Year 2025 and provide several other updates on Calvary.

In February, we provide Calvary's staff with annual Performance Appraisals (PAs) for the prior year. The Elders are called to work with the pastors and therefore the elders conduct Pastor Nick's and Pastor Eli's PAs. Cheryl and Mia report to Pastor Nick and he performs their PAs. Jake reports to the Administrative Team (AT) and the AT does his PA. And Jake conducts PAs with each of the people on his staff. I fully realize these are very boring, completely uninteresting, put-you-to-sleep details - but I share them in the hope of assuring you that we love everyone on our staff, we have a fantastic staff at Calvary, and we hold them accountable.

Calvary's Deacons are in the process of developing guidelines for selecting the causes that Calvary supports through our offerings. We want to support a variety of causes consistent with our Here, Near, and Far mission statement, consistent with our dedication to Christian Schools, and consistent with Calvary's overall mission. The guidelines have gone through a first draft review and will be finalized soon.

Pastor Eli and our Youth Ministries Team recently produced and distributed great training videos for everyone involved in our Nursery and our Youth Ministry. If you are a Nursery or Youth Ministry volunteer and you have not watched these videos, please do so. They are short, to the point, and very relevant. Even if you are not involved in those ministries, feel free to watch the videos, as you will learn more about Calvary. There are links on our website, or you can ask Pastor Eli how to find them.



Soon we will be installing glass doors/walls at the north and west ends of the Commons to assist Agamim (Charter school leasing our educational wing) to keep their students in the areas leased by Agamim. Our building is large, has many hallways and stairwells, and we want to make it easier for Agamim to guide their students through the areas leased by Agamim. The doors will be propped open on Sundays and will not affect Calvary's traffic flow. Agamim applied for and received a grant to install playground equipment on our property. We fully support this and sometime this spring, you will see playground equipment installed in the NW corner of our parking lot.

15 things you didn't know about Joe and WinAnn Schumi



- Joe and WinAnn Schumi are long-time members of Calvary Church. WinAnn started attending Calvary Church in the late 1960s, with Joe joining her after they married.
- 2. Born in Washington D.C., WinAnn (then Winifred Ann Ettesvold) grew up in Grand Rapids, Michigan. WinAnn was named after her father Winfred, who always went by Win. WinAnn attended Calvin Church with her family, went to Calvin Christian High School, and this may be a big surprise, attended Calvin College.
- 3. WinAnn excelled at piano, learning as a young girl, teaching lessons as an adult, accompanying her friends and children, and leading music during her many years serving through the Friendship Ministry.
- 4. Despite her short stature, at only 5 feet 4 inches, WinAnn played basketball in school. She spent many summers at the lake and loved to water ski, something she taught both her daughters on their annual summer pilgrimage to Michigan.
- After a brief stint teaching mathematics at Trinity College in Illinois, WinAnn returned to Minnesota to work at her alma mater and rose through the

- ranks to become the University's Associate Vice President for Research. She retired in 2008, after which she was in demand as a consultant. After she retired for real, WinAnn enjoyed volunteering at United Hospital.
- Doe Schumi grew up in Saint Paul, Minnesota and has lived pretty much within a 10 mile radius his whole life. (This was a good thing because before WinAnn taught him to drive, he could only get around by bus.)
- 7. Joe did all his higher education at the University of Minnesota, including his Ph.D. It was during that program that Joe and WinAnn met, as she was pursuing a Masters degree in Statistics. You can say he would not have his doctorate without her, since she typed his thesis.
- 8. Joe's high school classmates referred to him as a "brilliant lad" in the school yearbook. Indeed WinAnn was surprised at how many ladies came up to Joe at his 25th high school reunion to thank him for all the homework help.
- Although he never learned to skate, Joe was a true hockey fanatic. His favorite team was the Gophers, and he held season tickets for nearly half a century. Every year, he would

- take a few days off to watch the MN high school hockey tournament. Once upon a time, he coached a women's hockey team. This was long before he had kids, though he did his best to get his second daughter into the sport for a few brief years.
- 10. Joe and WinAnn married in August 1970 in Grand Rapids, MI. They went to Mackinac Island on their honeymoon where WinAnn had the "best fish she ever had in her life" for dinner.
- 11. Joe and WinAnn have two daughters, Jennifer and Melissa. Jennifer is married to Mike Cisneros and they live in St. Paul, MN. Melissa is married to Dennis Jones. They currently live in Colombia with Joe and WinAnn's two granddaughters Madeleine and Isabella.
- 12. Over the years, Joe and WinAnn traveled to lots of interesting places, Australia, England, France, Indonesia, Lesotho, New Zealand, Peru, and South Africa, and many trips to Italy, where Joe practiced his Italian conversation and WinAnn practiced her Italian leather shopping. Their favorite vacation spot was undoubtedly Sanibel Island, Florida, where they spent a few weeks every year for at least thirty years to rest and recharge with family and friends. Their favorite places on the island were the Lighthouse Café for breakfast and the Timbers for dinner.
- 13. Joe and WinAnn celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 2020 with a shower of cards from near and far. Thanks to everyone who helped make that anniversary so special.

Where do you work?

I have worked as a financial advisor for over 20 years. The first seven years I worked for Charles Schwab and the next ten years I worked for TD Ameritrade. Three years ago, I started my own Registered Investment Advisory firm called Elevation Wealth Management where I have the title President and Senior Wealth Advisor.

What are your roles and responsibilities?

I can remember one time inviting a coworker to church with me after having a conversation with him about God's Grace. He had been going through a divorce and had a void in his life. I shared with him that God can restore all situations and that he can find healing in Christ. To this day we have maintained a relationship and quite often talk about our faith.
