A Few Bible Verses and Books to Strengthen Marriages

As a pastor, I have the honor to lead couples through premarital counseling. I am not a licensed marriage counselor, but I have learned what the Bible and experienced counselors teach about healthy marriages. This article will point married couples and singles to the Scriptures and helpful books about marriage, sharing a glimpse of their teaching. It seems most marriage counseling happens before the wedding or when the marriage is falling apart. God's Word calls us to continue learning about and focusing on marriages throughout the different phases of life.

Genesis 2:18 "It is not good for man to be alone. I will make a suitable helper for him."

Before sin entered the world, the Lord created humans to be social creatures. After all the animals were made in their vast array, Adam did not have a companion. The word translated "suitable helper" comes from the Hebrew word ezer. This word does not mean a lesser being or a lifelong slave, it means a "faithful companion" or a "lifelong teammate." Later in the Old Testament, ezer is used for God himself in his relationship with Israel. This teaches us that a man and woman in marriage are to be selfless servants for life.

Matthew 19:6 "So they are no longer two, but one flesh. Therefore what God has joined together, let no one separate." Marriage is a covenant relationship, not a consumer

relationship. Many Americans approach marriage with a consumer mindset. "How can you help me accomplish my goals? My career hopes? My happiness?" Those can all be wonderful things that marriage helps you with, but in a consumer relationship, if those things don't happen the way you want, you break the contract and give up. In a covenant relationship, the promise of marriage occurs before God, family, and friends. That means the focus is not on "me, myself, and I" but how I can serve the Lord and love my spouse. When times get tough, the covenant relationship does not think, "How can I get out of this?" but "How can we get through this and become stronger because of it?"

Ephesians 5:22, 25 "Wives, submit yourselves to your own husbands as you do to the Lord. Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her to make her holy, cleansing her by the washing with water through the word."

Marriage is not only about happiness, but also holiness. It should make us more like Christ. It is an instrument for the Holy Spirit to purify our hearts and minds and decisions. It is strengthened by studying God's Word through church, Bible studies, and personal reading. Marriage is a glimpse of Christ's love for the church. It gives us a sneak peak into the loving commitment that Jesus has for us as God's people. Sacrifice and fulfillment are not polar opposites. God has created us to find immense joy and fulfillment in sacrificing and serving others, including our spouse.

This passage also reminds us that marriage and singleness can become idols. Sometimes married people idolize the "freedom" of singleness. They think life would be better away from this marriage relationship. Faith and science agree that life's meaning boils down to relationships. The perception of a good marriage can also be an idol. Instead of couples

being open and honest about conflict early on, they pretend nothing is wrong and avoid meaningful conversations with each other or with trusted Christian friends.

Sometimes single people idolize the "companionship" of marriage. They think all their problems will go away if they get married. They think marriage will be their messiah. The Bible teaches marriage is a union of two sinful people who need the grace of the true Messiah, Jesus Christ. The calling of marriage and the calling of singleness are gifts from God and can be used from the Kingdom of God.

Below are helpful books on marriage. Get one. Read it by yourself or with your spouse. Talk about it. Use it to deepen your understanding of marriage from God's perspective.





Where do you work?

I work for PAR Systems in Shoreview, MN.

What are your roles and responsibilities?

I'm in the mechanical engineering department. My day-to-day tasks include mechanical design, integrating commercial components with custom parts, and developing processes for advanced manufacturing. A great sense of humor is a requirement to be on this career path. We solve problems every day and schedules often get pushed back.

What are you currently working on that you are excited about?

I played a small part in a large waterjet cutting machine project for a key customer in Europe. It's as big as a barn with repeatability within the thickness of a paper. This machine will produce large longhaul aircraft, similar to what you see when driving next to MSP airport.

Since God is sovereign over every sphere, how do you see God at work in your work?

Like many others, I was in a very long job transition during the pandemic. It was a difficult time but also a time to grow spiritually – to rely on God like in Matthew 6:26. This week, my manager wants me to lead an R&D project and a non-profit organization just offered me to chair one of their committees. Three years ago I didn't see these things coming. God's timing is unique and that's why we shouldn't compare ourselves to others. At the end of the day we all have our comeback stories to share.

Are your co-workers Christians? Have you had opportunities to talk to them about what they believe? Have you been able to share your faith in Christ with them?

While Some of my coworkers are Christians and some are not. It's more noticeable around Eastertide as people are taking extra time off. Since my work is mostly in the STEM field, I've had dialogues with coworkers regarding creation – what can be taken word for word vs. what can be explained scientifically. There are areas that we agree and there are some that we disagree with. I feel nowadays people are very polarized with their opinions and the key here is to be humble and be open to dialogues.

15 things you didn't know about Stan and Jan Zahorsky



- 1. Jan grew up in a mid-size town in North Central Indiana, and she is the youngest of three children. She graduated from Purdue University School of Pharmacy. After graduation, she worked as a pharmacist in Indiana, Wisconsin, and Minnesota. In 1987 Jan had an opportunity to work for Eli Lilly as a pharmaceutical sales rep in Minneapolis, including the western and northern suburbs, and all the towns up to Saint Cloud. She worked with some wonderful Christian colleagues and met many Christian healthcare workers. Jan, especially, enjoyed calling on the psychiatrists in her territory. Being a good listener, she heard many of the doctors' life stories, along with their successes and woes, since they could not share their experiences and emotions with patients and most colleagues.
- 2. Stan was born and raised on a farm in Oklahoma, and he is the youngest of nine children which included eight boys and one girl. He began driving a tractor at the age

- of seven and had his first automobile accident at 11 or 12 years of age. At 12, Stan began driving combines and trucks throughout the Central Plains States, harvesting wheat and grass. Allis-Chalmers used photographs of his combine crew for their company promotions. His crew was featured in a short-subject film shown in cinema theaters.
- 3. Stan played basketball and baseball in high school and basketball and soccer in college. After college, Stan attended seminary in Kansas City and worked as a youth pastor. As he was finishing seminary, he was employed by the City of Kansas City to administer its social programs.
- 4. He was offered a job in Washington DC by Senator Bob Dole, but he chose to enter law school at William Mitchell College of Law in Saint Paul. Stan saw law school as a ministry; hence, he chose to start his own practice with another lawyer that he knew from his work at Legal Aid. He chose this avenue because he was

- aware that law firms require a large number of billable hours, and he wanted the freedom to be able to counsel clients when the legal matter was just a symptom of a root problem, and to discuss spiritual matters when appropriate.
- 5. For the last several years, he has been an affiliated attorney with the Alliance Defending Freedom (ADF), which is a nationwide network of Christian attorneys that represents Christians, churches, ministries, Christian schools and colleges, and students to protect their religious freedoms and free speech. Lawyers with ADF have won the majority of cases in the news protecting traditional values.
- 6. In younger years, Stan took up hang gliding because he was scared of heights and scuba diving because he was scared of water. Jan also took up scuba diving because of her fear of water, but it seems that warding off an intruder in her home in the middle of the night trumped her fear of water. One of the psychiatrists in her work environment helped Jan get past both fears. It was a winwin.
- 7. When Stan was single, he learned to skipper 30-40 foot sailboats. He and other skippers in the Grace Church singles group would take three-day sailing trips on Lakes Superior and Michigan. Additionally, Stan and Jan took friends sailing, and after they had kids, they took them sailing. One time they took another family and theirs



- sailing in Chesapeake Bay and the Atlantic Ocean where they tried to race submarines back to their base in Norfolk (they lost).
- 8. They were married at Park
 Ave. Methodist Church
 by Dr. Philip Hinerman in
 1988. Upon Dr. Hinerman's
 retirement, Bob Stamps
 became pastor with his wife,
 Ellen, who for a number
 of years was the personal
 assistant of Corrie Ten
 Boom. Ellen calls Stan, her
 "little brother", and they still
 maintain contact. We are not
 Dutch, but this church is not
 our first Dutch connection.
- 9. A few years later, they helped start an inner-city, interracial church, a block off Lake Street. They had a joint ministry with Urban Ventures and a Hispanic church that also met in the sanctuary. Monthly, they had wonderful church pot-luck dinners with their congregation and the Hispanic congregation. After ten years, they began attending Wooddale Church so their daughters could attend the youth programs. After their youngest daughter left home, they started

- attending Calvary.
- 10. An eventful day in the life of their family was September 30, 1999. Jan was broadsided in her car. That evening Stan was having chest pains, but he coached our middle daughter's basketball game. Afterwards, Jan convinced him to go to the ER, where he was held for quadruple by-pass heart surgery two days later. Two weeks later Jan could hardly walk and soon quit her job. She learned that she had a congenital, degenerative spinal condition. For the past thirteen years she has been going at least twice a week to a neck and back strengthening program at Tria for relief and to postpone back surgery.
- 11. After their youngest daughter started school, their former daycare provider and good friend asked Jan to join her and other women to study the Bible through the Precept Bible Study at Wooddale Church. It has been a joy studying God's Word.
- 12. Stan brought a blue and gold macaw into the marriage, which he has had for 42

- years. His name is Lord Butterfield, and he follows the biblical prescriptive for a family, because in his mind, Stan is the head of the house, being a male he is second in charge, then, Jan, and following that are their girls. (With that said, the four women and their female dog far outnumbered the boys the boys just let them think they were in charge!)
- 13. Jan attended her 50th high school class reunion last September. One of the highlights was riding the Cass County Denzel Carousel which is an important landmark in her hometown and a memory from her childhood. The menageriestyle carousel was built in 1902 and is on the National Historic Landmark registry.
- 14. Most of their vacations have been to visit family in Indiana, Oklahoma, and Kansas City, but they have taken family vacations to Great Britain, France, Italy, Nature Conservancy ranch in Montana, Yellowstone, and other national parks. One of their favorite pastimes is to listen to Southern Gospel and Gaither music on Spotify and YouTube. Another favorite activity is watching sappy, happy ending, mindless movies.
- 15. They have three daughters:
 Cate, her husband, and our
 granddaughter, Winnie,
 live in Bayfield, WI; Liz, her
 husband, and our grandson,
 Ezra lives in Atlanta, GA; and
 Danae lives in the Twin Cities

They have found God is faithful to those who seek him.

Commons Renovation Update

Since the congregation approved the Commons Renovation project, several exciting developments have occurred. First, in late February, BDH completed the design documents, with the help of the Commons Renovation Team. These plans were then used to conduct a competitive bid process with three general contractors. In early March, each prospective general contractor toured the construction space and by late March bids were received. After a question and answer period and a follow-up on site meeting, Calvary has executed a contract with Sherburne-Slater Construction from Edina to complete the Commons Renovation project. Sherburne-Slater and BDH are already working with the City of Edina to secure permits for the project.

In addition to this important milestone, Elmer Jelgerhuis, committee members, and I have been busy working on Calvary supplied items like furniture, appliances, and the audio-visual components of the project. With the admin team, we are also working on the final scope of the project such as which furniture and signage to replace and where carpet replacement will begin and end. One exciting item presently included in the project is new carpet throughout the sanctuary area.

At the time of this article, we are tracking a tentative construction start in mid-June. In the

coming weeks we will be working with Sherburne-Slater to finalize a more detailed weekly project schedule, to confirm all material selections with BDH, and to work with the facilities staff to prepare the project area for construction. Over the next several weeks you will probably begin to notice furniture, artwork, and library books disappearing from the construction area. I hope to be able to provide several updates throughout the project, but feel free to reach out to me at any time with questions about the project.

When construction work does begin, the Commons area will look quite different from week to week. While we will work closely with the contractor and with the facilities staff to minimize disruption to our weekly worship activities, your patience and attentiveness during the project will be greatly appreciated. Like any renovation, some dust and untidiness can be expected, along with tools and materials in some parts of the commons area. While this could make for several unusual weeks of fellowship before and after our summer services, I think I can safely say that the newly renovated space will be a beautiful, useful, and much needed upgrade to the most public areas of our church.
