NEW MEMBER REFLECTIONS

On Sunday, May 16, Calvary Church welcomed several new members into our fellowship. Some were returning members, some were people raised in the CRC who found themselves in the Twin Cities, and some were brand new to the reformed faith.

While all our new members are different and represent different places in life, there was a theme in what many of them said about why they were at Calvary: they were personally invited to come. Whether it was an invitation from a family member, friend, fellow basketball player, or co-worker, a personal invitation was why they visited. It struck me that despite having a Facebook Page, website, YouTube Channel, digital front sign, etc., the best way to get a new person into the door of a church is still a personal invitation.

It makes sense. Visiting an unfamiliar building filled with unfamiliar people can be a very intimidating thing. For those of us who come to this building often, it

is easy to forget how foreboding visiting a strange place and strange people can be. Knowing at least one person and having been invited personally puts some of this fear/uncertainty to rest.

To be clear, this does not give us an excuse for staying off social media or not having a website; many visitors have found us because of our website or our YouTube Channel. Calvary currently has a team of people that is working hard at pursuing various marketing leads to see if there are opportunities to connect with new and different kinds of people; this is part of what it means to be missional. However, it needs to be said that a personal invitation remains the number one way someone will visit a church.

Interview with Alan Rindels

Where do you work?

I work for the Metropolitan (Metro) District of the Minnesota Department of Transportation

What are your roles and responsibilities?

My role - Transportation Project Manager responsible for developing the project scope, budget and delivery of projects

across the Metro District. The scope of the projects range from \$3 to \$20 million and are primarily driven by pavement maintenance rehabilitation needs, which drives by policy upgrades of all pedestrian crossings to current ADA standards, drainage improvements, trails and bridges. Projects are scoped approximately five years from when they are finally constructed to provide the necessary time to address design, permitting and environmental due diligence.

What are you currently working on that you are excited about?

One project which I am spending considerable time on is to be delivered in 2024 is a Mill and Overlay project on TH55 in Plymouth. Yes, it is 2024 but there are multiple aspects of this project which will make the roadway safer for the traveling motorist, including modifying access at multiple intersections in Plymouth. It is exciting to be able to help the traveling public by providing the leadership to accomplish adding safety improvements to this roadway to prevent crashes.

Another project is on TH55 in North Minneapolis, we are trying to remodel that section of roadway to best serve the multimodal needs of the current residents and others who use that roadway. If successful, we will connect the Luce Line bike trail to downtown through this corridor.

What in your job reveals God's sphere sovereignty?

The Minnesota Department of Transportation works very hard to listen to project constituents, they work closely with city and county staff and respond to questions and comments from the general public. In the past, they may not have listened as well (for example the Rondo Community which is in the news). That is why there is the municipal consent law which requires cities to agree with MnDOT's projects, and why we are being asked to right the wrongs done many years ago. I see this caring in the staff I work with and believe this is God's Sphere sovereignty at MnDOT.

How do you see God at work in your job?

My career has not been a linear progression. I spent time in graduate school getting a PhD, exploring topics in fluid mechanics and environmental hydraulics, some years as a consulting engineer and at MnDOT focused on water resources, many years as a stay at home dad, over-involved as president of a youth soccer club in Bloomington, transportation research engineer, and now a Principal Project manager. There have been occasions where life has not been very pleasant and some would say I was not very successful. However, God is faithful and has a plan, and from these experiences the people skills and knowledge learned from these many experiences has led me to this current role as a project manager. So yes, I see God at work in my job as he has provided me with the skills necessary to lead these projects and guided me to this current role at MnDOT. God has been faithful and I am blessed.

Are your co-workers Christians? Have you had opportunities to talk to them about what they believe? Have you been able to share your faith in Christ with them?

I do have some wonderful coworkers who are Christian, and we are able to share our faith and support one another. Being in management, I am Yes, for example one of my coworkers left a high level position leading Metro Materials Office (pavement design office) and currently is teaching math and science in Guatemala for a school for missionaries. I am very respectful and quietly talk to them about their beliefs as some are Muslim, Hindu, etc., but many are friends on Facebook. I use my Facebook page as a social media venue to share my Christian faith to my coworkers at MnDOT and believe in the promises of Isaiah 55:11 which says:

So shall My word be that goes forth from My mouth;
It shall not return to Me [a]void,
But it shall accomplish what I please,
And it shall prosper in the thing for which I sent it.
